# PRIORITY THEME: PATTERNS OF GROWTH

Why: connectedness; enhance village centre; prioritise community needs

(village centre enhanced short/ medium/ long term; community facilities and uses to the South/ west of Pitmedden along B999 corridor, priority allocation of adequate land for a new community hub and school)
